

What is 'outline'?

An outline is a brief focus on an issue in a given text, focussing on either the most important information or a particular question / topic / issue. Consequently, it contains the main aspects or ideas of a text, that are needed to point on, what you are trying to prove.

An outline is not necessarily very long but it sets a clear focus. Include the main idea and the important supporting fact. It is necessary to exclude any information which will deflect your aim. Do not write a full summary of your text.

What is the structure like?

- 1. **Thesis statement / leading question** (it is not necessary to include the 5 w's question where it does not make sense)
- 2. **Detailed argumentation** (1. name it [main idea/topic sentence], 2. explain it, 3. prove it [important supporting fact])
- 3. There is in general **no need for a concluding paragraph**. (However, if you feel that it makes sense, write one.)

'Outline' can bring you around 20-25 BE. Be sure to include enough important information in it to get all the available BE. **Brief does not mean superficial**.
